
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ACR+ activities on waste prevention

→ Waste prevention database

- Quantitative approach
- About 40 cases so far; more are to be included in the coming months
- **→ Benchmarks** (-100kg / -15%)
- → Projects and campaings
 - Waste prevention
 - Sustainable consumption and production
 - Waste management capacity building
- **→** Training expertise
 - Training of municipality representatives and waste managers on waste prevention planning
- → Knowledge sharing
 - Studies, reports and news

Directive EC/2008/98 ("Waste Framework Directive")

Article 3:

- → Measures taken before waste is created
 - Strict avoidance (e.g. promoting tap water)
 - Reduction at source (e.g. home composting)
- → Including reuse (e.g. flea markets)
- → Quantitative and qualitative
 - adverse impacts of generated waste
 - content of harmful substances in the waste









A little bit of context: Why addressing waste prevention?

European Legal provisions

- → Waste management hierarchy Art. 4
 - Priotity order in legislation and policy
 - Waste prevention is the first priotity



- → National waste prevention programmes Art. 29
 - ► By 12 December 2013
 - Local waste prevention programmes for implementing national plans
- → Promotion of re-use of products and preparation for re-use Art. 11
 - Re-use centers (social economy at local level)



A little bit of context: Why addressing waste prevention?

Economic and environmental costs

- → Waste collection and management
 - Facilities and service
 - The collectivity has to pay for the costs



- → Greenhouse gas emissions
 - Lifecycle of products
 - Methane from landfills
 - CO2 from trucks collecting waste
 - CO2 from incineration plants and other waste management plants







EX: ACT AGAINST FOOD WASTAGE (food = 20-30% of total CO2 emissions)

Oporto Region-Lipor (Portugal)
... serving the right portion

20-25kg less per restaurant/day

EU BENCHMARK -10 kg

EX: COMPOSTING AT SOURCE (individuals, neighbourhood, green areas)

Rennes Metropole (France) ... community composting

Some good practices: "Welcome to Poubellec'h", France

- → EWWR 2009 awards winner (Jury's favourite)
- → Initiator/coordinator: Communauté des communes de la Presqu'île de Crozon
- → Description: An educational game designed to raise awareness among Crozon's inhabitants about actions that lead to the production of less waste

Some good practices: "Waste Watchers", Spain

- → EWWR 2010 awards winner (Jury's favourite)
- → Initiator/coordinator: AERESS / RREUSE
- → Description: Pan-European initiative, which consists in collecting old items no longer wanted by their owners and reselling them in reuse centres that weigh and communicate the amount of items they sell, i.e. the amount of waste avoided

What can be done?

- → Be an **Organiser** in areas where there is no one:
 - If you are a public authority or have a mandate from a public authority
- → Be a **Project Developer**:
 - Refer to the national/regional Organiser
 - Use expertise of previous years (good practices and case studies)
 - Every action is important. Let your imagination work!
- → Stay informed:
 - Subscribe to the <u>EWWR newsletter</u>
 - Results of <u>EWWR 2009-2012</u>, guide of <u>good practices</u>, action <u>database</u>, etc.

Some Pre-waste good practices:

Anti-advertising sticker (stop-pub) with legal backing, Belgium

→ Waste fraction: Paper - unwanted advertisement and/or free newspress

PUB RECLAME

- → Initiator/coordinator: Brussels Environment IBGE
- → Description:
 - Since 1999, a sticker is available for the mailbox of Brussels residents by which they can choose not to receive unaddressed advertisements and/or free newspapers.
 - The sticker received legal backing through a regional regulation, which entitles individuals to **file a complaint if they receive unwanted advertising and/or newspapers** in their mailbox despite having placed the sticker.





Some Pre-waste good practices:

"Library" for borrowing clothes (Lånegarderoben),

Sweden

→ Waste fraction: Textile

→ Initiator/coordinator:
Culture association: KREATIVITET

→ Description:

- Borrowers wardrobe that opened in 2010 in Stockholm, where you borrow clothes instead of books.
- Membership fee of approx 50 Euros entitles to borrow 1-3 articles for three weeks. Washing instructions are included to avoid mistakes...

Some Pre-waste good practices:

A guide for repairing, selling and reusing goods,

France

- → Waste fraction: Several (EEE, clothing, furniture, DIY, etc.)
- → Initiator/coordinator: Rennes Métropole
- → Description:
 - inventory of every actors on the territory that can help giving a second life to a product (repairing shop, renting, resale...) has led to printed guides & an online guide.
 - Several parameters of research: type of object, type of action (to buy, to give away, to have something repaired...) or location.





- → 3-years LIFE+ project (2010-2012) to demonstrate efficient actions and methods to reduce the generation of bio-waste (food waste, green waste) in cities
- → The main outputs:
 - Inventory of 10 detailed good practices (with indicators)
 - Home, community and on-site composting
 - Fight against food waste
 - Closed loop gardening
 - Reuse
 - Monitoring / assessment methodologies and computarised tool
 - Demonstration actions in partners area
- → Dissemination of results during the final conference on 20-21 November 2012 in Rennes

Some Miniwaste good practices: Home composting: Kent (UK)

- → Target: 18,500 tonnes from 103,000 bins sold. Minimum 250 active compost advisors.
- → Initiative involving stakeholders at early stage, identifying targets (schools), relying on urban characteristics (gardens) and in collaboration with national networks (WRAP, etc.)



→ Instruments: Restrictions in collection facilities; Subsidies; On the job training; Information.





Some Miniwaste good practices: Closed loop gardening: Flanders (Belgium)

→ Target: 42% of citizens participate actively in home composting and 25% of skilled citizens practicing home composting (treating at least half of their bio-waste) in 2015



- → Comprehensive approach to reduce green waste (grass cycling, greenscaping and composting)
- → Instruments: PAYT, cooperation agreements between region and municipalities, training and support from 'Master composters' and active home composters, demonstration and communication activities, subsidies to municipalities for compost bins





Some good practices: "Love Food Hate Waste" campaign, UK



→ Initiator/coordinator: WRAP



→ Description: national campaign / local implementation to raise awareness on food wastage reduction (branding, cooking demonstrations, trainings, collaborative website, etc.)



→ Involvement of public authorities, retailers and citizens













Waste less in Chianti



- → 3-years LIFE+ project (2011-2013) to reduce:
 - municipal waste sent to landfill or incineration by 15% in 5 years
 - municipal waste production by 100 kg/inhabitant by 2020 (-15% compared with 2007)
 - CO2 emission produced in the Chianti territory
- → Project actions:
 - Implementation of a waste prevention and reduction program in the Chianti territory
 - Evaluation of the effectiveness of the integrated program through the development of a monitoring tool
 - Establishment and consolidation of a local stakeholders pool
 - Communication and dissemination of the project results
